Frederick Douglass Day

On behalf of the Frederick Douglass Honor Society, the Town of Easton, the Talbot County Council, and the Talbot County Free Library, we welcome you to our annual Frederick Douglass Day. Today we salute Frederick Douglass, who was born into slavery in the year 1818 and against all odds became one of the most famous men in American history. In an obituary notice (1895), the *Easton Gazette* editor, Wilson M. Tyler, wrote that Douglass “has occupied the most exalted position of any member of his race in the world. Talbot reveres his memory.”

An orator and astonishing writer, Douglass became a newspaper editor, a political activist, and statesman. He was a champion for women’s rights, especially their right to vote, a brilliant strategist, newspaper owner, and author. No book had as powerful an impact on the American abolitionist movement as the *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass, an American Slave*.

His life spanned the Civil War, the end of slavery and the beginning of segregation. Celebrated internationally as the leading Black intellectual of his time, his story still resonates today. Douglass’s talents and determination helped him leave an enduring mark upon our history and a ranking among such prominent figures as Abraham Lincoln, W. E. B. Du Bois, Susan B. Anthony, and Martin Luther King, Jr.

We hope you enjoy today’s celebration of the life and legacy of our native son, Frederick Douglass.

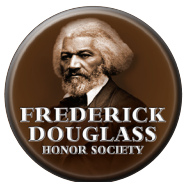

Frederick Douglass History



The man we know as Frederick Douglass was born Frederick Augustus Washington Bailey in Talbot County, MD, February 1818. His mother, a slave named Harriet Bailey, gave birth to him in the cabin of her mother Betsey Bailey, also a slave but one whose husband, Isaac, was free. The cabin was in a small ravine on Tuckahoe Creek near what is now the village of Cordova. Frederick's mother soon returned to the farm where she worked, and he only saw her a few times thereafter. She died when he was eight years old. His earliest years were spent with his grandparents Isaac and Betsey Bailey.

In 1824, at the age of six, Frederick and his grandmother walked twelve miles to Wye House plantation, where she was then forced to leave him to fend for himself. His owner, Aaron Anthony, was employed at Wye as an overseer. Anthony died within two years and Frederick was transferred to the possession of Thomas Auld, Anthony's son-in-law. He was sent by Auld's wife to her sister in-law Sophia Auld in Fells Point, Baltimore, to be a companion to Hugh and Sophia's son. Frederick was recognized as a gifted child, and Sophia began to teach him to read, although doing so was illegal. Her husband stopped the lessons, saying that if a slave was taught to read he would no longer be satisfied to remain a slave, words that Frederick overheard and took to heart. He continued to read in secret. He bought "The Columbian Orator," memorizing the speeches and practicing oratory.

Frederick was returned to the Eastern Shore when his services were no longer needed in Baltimore. By then, Colonel Lloyd, owner of the Wye House plantation, owned Frederick. The young man organized a weekly Sunday school, teaching other slaves to read the New Testament. Within a short time, several slave owners discovered this forbidden activity and broke up the meetings. Frederick tried to escape his master several times and was severely punished. After one such attempt, the escape plot was discovered and Frederick was tied and led behind a team of horses to the county jail in Easton. Ultimately, his master returned him to Baltimore to learn the trade of ship caulking. In 1838, he managed his successful escape with help from friends. To avoid being discovered and returned to slavery, Frederick stopped using the last name Bailey and called himself Frederick Johnson. He later changed his last name again to Douglass, choosing to spell Douglass with a slight difference – a double "s".

Frederick and his wife Anna had five children: three sons and two daughters. He became a licensed preacher in the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church, and he began to attend abolitionist meetings. Thus began the career of a great orator, editor, author, suffragist, reformer, statesman, and advisor to Presidents. In 1878, in sharp contrast to his beginning in Talbot County, Douglass returned to Easton and spoke at the Courthouse, Asbury U. M. Church, and Bethel A.M.E. Church as an accomplished and respected leader.

He died February 20, 1895, both nationally and internationally acclaimed as one of the most influential men of his century.

Boots is employed by the St. Peter and Paul Catholic Church. He has worked closely with the Frederick Douglass Honor Society and the Frederick Douglass Day Committee for many years.

Taylor Beck is a student at Bowie State University pursuing a degree in Accounting and Business. A graduate of Easton High School, Taylor graduated with honors and received a Certificate of Achievement for her academic excellence and leadership.

Known for her excellent trailblazing accomplishments, she was recently appointed by Governor Wes Moore as a member of the Maryland Economic Development Corporation's Board of Directors.

Dana Newman is the Director of the Talbot County Free Library. She is a graduate of the Maryland Library Leadership Institute, a longtime member of the Maryland Library Association, a member of the Easton Rotary and is serving as President of the Maryland Association of Public Library Administrators, among other professional affiliations. 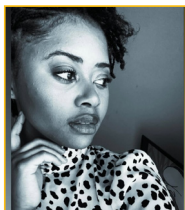

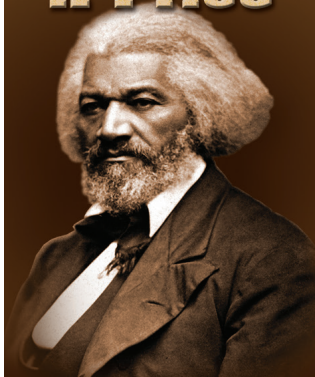

Freedom Still Has A Price



In late 1846, abolitionist and Quaker Mary Richardson of England wrote to slave owner Hugh Auld in Baltimore asking if Frederick Bailey's freedom had a price. Auld replied that he would manumit Frederick for £150, or \$711.66.

Richardson and others on both sides of the Atlantic raised the funds, and on Dec. 5, 1846, Auld filed Douglass's deed of manumission—literally “releasing the hand of authority”—in Baltimore Co.

The Hill Community Walking Tour

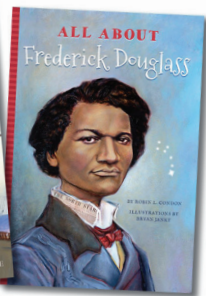
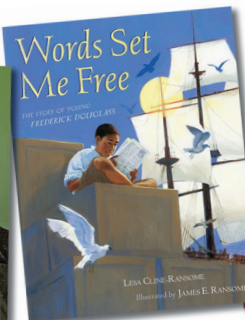
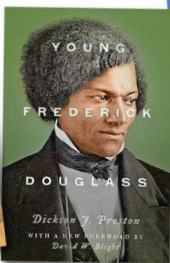
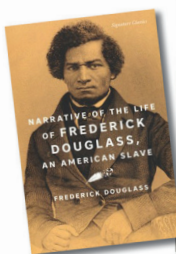
The Hill Community Walking Tour will begin at 3 p.m. in front of the Avalon Theatre in Easton and will be led by **Yvonne Freeman**. Easton's Hill Community has been home to free African Americans since the 1780s, more than 80 years before the Civil War ended in 1865. Free black people resided throughout early Easton, living side by side with white neighbors and with enslaved people. Stops on the tour include the Hambleton House, the James Freeman Home, the Bethel African American Episcopal Church, the Buffalo Soldier House, and the Asbury United Methodist Church.



Frederick Douglass Reading Challenge

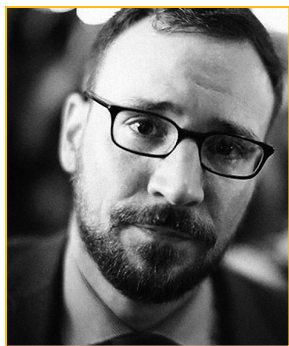

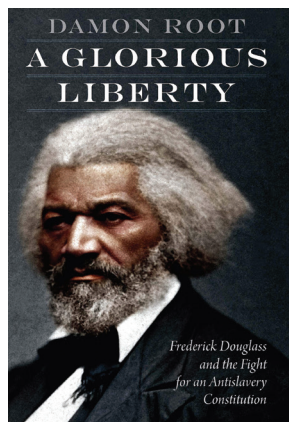

Keynote Speaker



Damon Root is a senior editor at *Reason*, and the author of *Reason's* semiweekly *Injustice System* newsletter. He is also the author of two books: *A Glorious Liberty: Frederick Douglass and the Fight for an Antislavery Constitution* (Potomac Books, 2020) and *Overruled: The Long War for Control of the U.S. Supreme Court* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2014). Root's third book, *Emancipation War: The Fall of Slavery and the Coming of the Thirteenth Amendment* (Potomac Books 2026).

A Glorious Liberty, has been praised by reviewers, who called it “refreshing and thoughtful” (*Intellectual History Review*), “thoroughly researched and readable” (*The Objective Standard*), “informed” (*Shepherd Express*), “a meticulously researched celebration of the intellectual legacy of Frederick Douglass” (Radley Balko), “a highly accessible and engaging overview of abolitionist constitutionalism” (Randy Barnett), “a great and important book” (Greg Lukianoff), and “brilliant...one of the best concise histories of the movement to end slavery” (*Los Angeles Lawyer Magazine*). According to the columnist and author George F. Will, “today once again the original constitution is being vilified, as a validation of slavery, by people with disresponsible agendas and negligible understanding. Damon Root, who explicates the great document as well as anyone writing today, brings the patience of Job and noble ally – Frederick Douglass – to the task of refuting this recycled canard. Root and Douglass, like root beer and ice cream, are an irresistible American combination.”



Emancipation War: The Fall of Slavery and the Coming of the Thirteenth Amendment draws on Damon's encyclopedic knowledge

of constitutional law and history. Pulitzer-Prize winning columnist George Will called Damon “one of the most consistently illuminating writers of constitutional questions”, and Greg Lukianoff, CEO of the Foundation for Individual Rights and Expression, praised *Emancipation War* “a powerfully written book – and a genuine joy to read.”

Root is the winner of the 2015 Los Angeles Press Club Award for Best Political/Government Reporting and the winner of the 2011 R.C. Hoiles Prize for Journalism. Root's book *A Glorious Liberty* was named a 2021 Outstanding Academic Title by the editors of *Choice*, a publication of the Association of College and Research Libraries.

Root's work has been cited by the Texas Supreme Court and in the writings of U.S. Supreme Court Justice John Paul Stevens. His work has been cited in leading scholarly journals, including the *Columbia Law Review*, the *Notre Dame Law Review*, and the *Georgetown Journal of Law & Public Policy*. His 2007 essay on NAACP co-founder Moorfield Storey was recommended in *Race & Liberty in America: The Essential Reader* (University Press of Kentucky).

Root's writing has appeared in the Los Angeles *Daily News*, *Chicago Sun-Times*, *Newsweek*, *New York Post*, *New York Daily News*, *New York Press*, *Washington Times*, *WallStreetJournal.com*, *The Globe and Mail*, *The Orange County Register*, and other publications.

Root has spoken before audiences at Harvard Law School, Georgetown Law Center, Columbia University, and the New York Civil Liberties Union, and he has been featured on C-Span's Book TV, the Fox Business Channel, New York Public Radio, SIRIUS Satellite Radio, and other media outlets.

Frederick Douglass Artifacts

Some of the items from the National Park Service that we will have on display at the Talbot County Free Library:

Photo of Frederick Douglass in Haiti (top right)

Frederick Douglass served as the Minister to Haiti (known today as ambassadors) from 1889-1891. Douglass worked tirelessly to help stabilize Haiti, a country amid turmoil. He promoted "enlightened diplomacy," endorsing U.S. expansion into the region while aiding Caribbean development.

Sitting at his desk in Haiti, Douglass fought for the independence of Haitian politics from U.S. interference. Douglass announced his resignation by saying he could not accept imperialism "as a foundation upon which I could base my diplomacy."

Washington Monument Invitation (middle right)

From his home on Cedar Hill, Douglass potentially watched the monument being constructed. Douglass served as the Recorder of Deeds from 1881-1886, and his occupation is denoted on the invitation.

John Sherman, a United States Senator from Ohio, invited Douglass to the dedication of the monument. It is unknown if Douglass attended the event, but he frequently walked to the Monument for daily exercise.

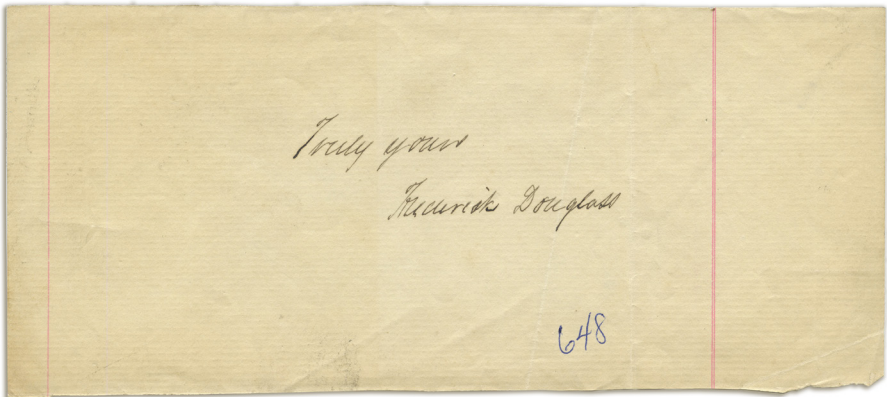
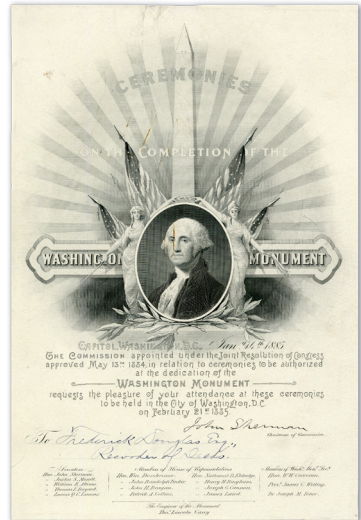
Little is known about this piece, but it is painted on granite of similar color to that used for the monument. On the back, there is an indentation from a tool, possibly a drill or chisel.

Constitution of the United States (not shown)

A "pocket sized" copy of the United States Constitution gifted to Fredrick Douglass by William H. Smith in 1866. Smith, a prominent African American Washingtonian, served as a House of Representatives library messenger.

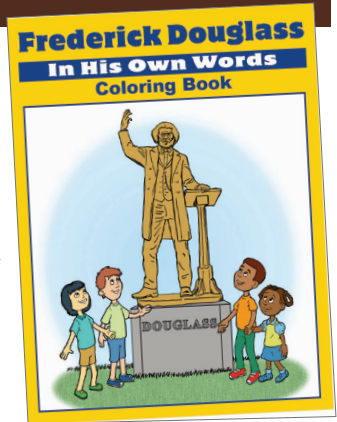
In 1881, Smith became the Librarian of the House, elevating him to be one of the highest-ranking African Americans in the federal government at the time. Smith worked closely with Douglass to oppose segregation in the District of Columbia.

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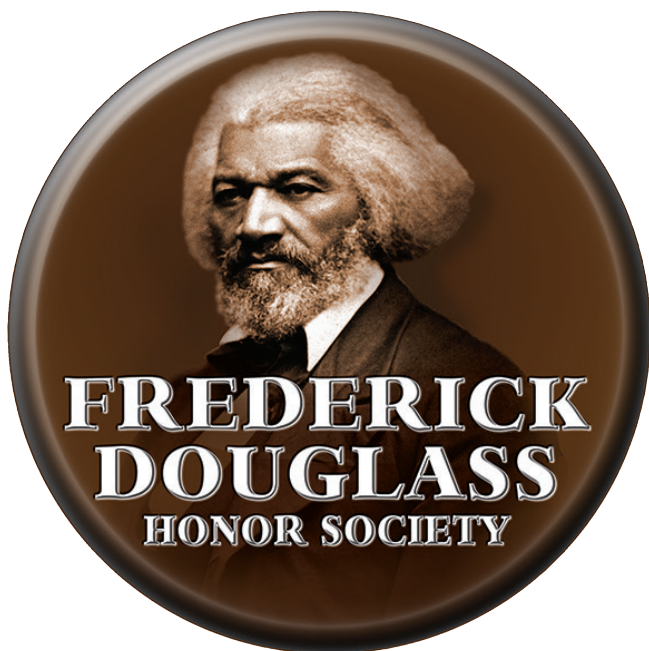


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The Frederick Douglass Honor Society
